The 15th Amendment (ratified 1870) enfranchised African-American men; women were given the right to vote by the 19th Amendment (ratified 1920); and the 26th Amendment (ratified 1971) allowed individuals 18 years of age or older to vote. The Voting Rights Act of 1965 prohibits the imposition of any voting law that results in discrimination against racial minorities. Despite this, voter inclusion still remains a compelling issue for all Americans. How do we assure that everyone who wants to vote has the right to vote? Voter ID laws, residency requirements and concerns about mail ballots present challenges to Americans exercising their right to vote.
